MEMORANDON FOR THE CHIEF OF STAFF:

SUBJECT: Training of Weaponners.

- l. The empakility of the AAF to perform effectively and promptly YHB effensive operations in the event of emergency is impaired by the present very limited availability of weaponeers and bumb commanders. By separate ecommunications, the Air Ferces has recommended to the Director of Plans and Operations that partinent directives be issued to achieve the training of certain personnel, to be made available by the AAF, to fill an immediate requirement in semmestion with the above mentioned air ocmbat erew positions.
- 2. While the AAF interposes no objection to the action of the Manhattan Project under which twenty-seven (27) Engineer officers are being trained, it holds the firm conviction that the technician serving as a veapomer on a combat mission must be a member of the air combat erew, and properly trained as such, as has been the accepted procedure for the bumb commander.
- J. The pre-combat conditioning of members of air combat crows involves their frequent participation as a team in gaining experience in high altitude long-range operation of multi-engined aircraft and in acquiring that experience is operational missions which will minimise the human error in the ultimate placement of the bond on its target. In the development of such teamwork, considerations of experience gained in World War II make it mandatory that all crosses be assigned members of an air unit of the Army Air Forces.
- 4. It is realised that from time to time weaponeers and bemb sommanders will require refresher technical training. This can be achieved on a temperary duty basis by rotation through Manhattan Project installations.
- 5. I recommend that the position of the army Air Feroes as expressly indicated in paragraphs 2 and 3 above be approved as War Department policy and appropriate agencies advised thereof.
