1. This headquarters is cognizant of press interests in the socalled "flying saucers" reports, referred to by this headquarters as "unidentified merial objects." Your headquarters has previously been advised as to the release of information concerning Air Force interest in this subject. Your attention is invited to USAF PIO release of 6 September 1950 and Hq USAF letter, subject "Reporting of Information on Unconventional Aircraft," dated 8 September 1950.

2. In a recent telephone conversation between Colonel Watson, Hq AMC and Colonel Harris, this headquarters, Colonel Watson requested guidance in the matter of releasing results of investigation, analysis, and evaluation of incidents brought to his attention. This headquarters believes that release of details of analysis and evaluation of incidents is inadvisable, and desires that, in lieu thereof, release conform to the policy and spirit of the following:

#### · PROBLEM

1. To advise Col Watson, AMC, concerning proper procedure for handling unidentified aerial object reports.

#### FACTS AND DISCUSSION

2. On 9 Oct 50, Gen Moore instructed Col Harris, AFOIV-TC, to telephone Col Watson, AMC, and advise him that photographs of an unidentified aerial object were to be evaluated by Intelligence Dept, AMC, and not to be forwarded to D/I for evaluation.

3. The telephone call to Intelligence Dept, AMC was consummated with Lt Col Dunn, inasmuch as Col Watson was away for the day.

4. Col Watson had requested that authority be granted to release all details concerning incidents brought to his attention for analysis. It is Gen Moore's opinion that it is unnecessary to release full details resulting from analysis of incidents, and, in all cases cognizant to the press, the following may be released:

"We have investigated and evaluated \_\_\_\_\_\_ incident and have found nothing of value and nothing which would change our previous estimates on this subject."

5. Intelligence Dept, AMC was further advised that, should results of such incidents contain information of any technical intelligence value, they should not be released but should be sent to D/I, Hq USAF.

6. A ltr has been prepared by AFOIV-TC to Hq AMC confirming the policy outlined in the telephone conversation.

2. The following summarizes Mr Materiel Command responsibilities in precessing these reports, and supersedes all previous instructions on this subjects

a. As implied in para. 1 of letter referenced above, reports on subject will be processed in the same manner as other technical intelligence information, according to their apparent suthenticity and importance.

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b. Air Materiel Command will continue to investigate, analyze, and evaluate this information as part of its obligation to produce air technical intelligence. In investigating incidents or sightings of this character, Air Materiel Command will be respensible for utilizing such facilities as the importance of the incident may appear to deserve, including OSI personnel, AND depot personnel, or special teams.

c. In accordance with para. So of letter referenced in para. 1 above, reports of unconventional aircraft from USAF-controlled sources will be forwarded direct to Gaumanding General, Air Materiel Command, Attm: MUIS. Reports coming to this headquarters from other sources will be forwarded immediately to Air Materiel Command. On account of this direct channel it is important that AMG be especially aware of its responsibility for d. The fact that Intelligence Reports on Form 112 on this subject will not come through this headquarters will leave gaps in the series of IR numbers in our Documents Files, thereby complicating accounting procedures. To alleviate this condition and to previde complete references for the Directorate of Intelligence, it is requested that the Director of Intelligence, ANO immediately forward one (1) copy of each Intelligence Report on this subject to Director of Intelligence, Hq USAF, Attn: AFOIG-DD. No inclosures need be forwarded.

e. Intelligence requirements or requests for follow-up collection action on this subject will be addressed to this headquarters in the usual manner.

f. Information received direct from non-governmental sources may be acknowledged and fellow-up information obtained by direct correspondence.

g. Queries from the press as to USAF interest in "flying saucers" may be answered generally to the effect that the USAF has a continuing interest in all air technical and scientific information and therefore has an interest in any such reports which may appear to be pertinent to this category of information.

3. Review of your Project No. 10075, subject: "Avaluation of Reports on Specialized Aircraft", dated 18 July 1950, suggests that modifications should be made to take into account the provisions of para. 2c and 2d above. Nedification is further suggested to remove restrictions on investigation of incidents; predicating the extent of investigation entirely on the apparent importance of the information as determined by the Commanding General, Air Materiel Command.

#### MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD

#### PROBLEM:

1. To prepare a letter informing the Commanding General, AMC, of recommendations and action by Hq. USAF in regard to the discontinuance of Project Grudge.

#### FACTS AND DISCUSSION:

2. In September 1949, the D/I received what was considered by Hq. AMC to be a final report on the findings of Project Grudge (unidentified aerial objects). Since investigations and analyses did not reveal that so-called "flying saucer" incidents involved other than misidentifications of conventional objects, natural phenomena, and some hoax, Hq. AMC asked that the special project activity on such reports be discontinued.

3. After conversation on 12 September 1949 between Col. Macomber, AFMRD, and Maj. Boggs, AFOAI, Col. Macomber unofficially reviewed the AMC report on Project Grudge and concurred in a memorandum prepared for the JIC informing all Services of the Department of Defense on findings and asking for comment on proposal to return reports of flying saucer incidents to normal intelligence interest.

4. Both the Department of the Army and Department of the Navy, through the JIC, have concurred fully in the findings of Project Grudge and concur that the requirement for Project Grudge has been fulfilled.

5. Unwarranted speculation in the press on the nature of flying saucers required that some public release be made on 27 December 1949 by the Air Force. The press was informed that the special project was being discontinued and the reasons therefor. Maj. Boggs, AFOAI-DA, advised the project officer, Lt. Smith, of this action by telephone.

6. Letter has been prepared to Commanding General, AMC, recommending discontinuance of special project action on "flying saucer" reports and advising that Hq. USAF collection requirements on the subject are being canceled. AMC is asked to retain their project file as the official record. Project Grudge Technical Report is being forwarded to AFOPO for review by the Psychological Warfare Division, as recommended by AMC.

1. The inclosed report is forwarded to your department for analysis and comment. It is probable that a definite conclusion cannot be reached from the facts presented in the report.

2. The nature of the observation suggests a possibility of the object being a lighted balloon. However, this explanation was explored when LTJG Haven was interviewed by Lt. Colonel Willis, Technical Gapabilities Branch. LTJG Haven stated that jet fighters had made interceptions on his aircraft on many occasions. He stated that the light had a speed range much greater than a jet fighter. It appeared to circle his aircraft at a terrific rate of speed, even when climbing. The rate of climb was estimated to be over 2000 feet per minute. Therefore, it would not be possible to class this incident as a lighted weather balloon, if the description is considered accurate.

S. It is requested that this report be reviewed and evaluation forwarded to this Headquarters.

2. Detailed study has been made of attached letter and NO. 2 inclosures from Continental Air Command. Final analyses were delayed awaiting receipt of twenty-four hour weather reports for 8 and 9 Mar 1950 for Selfridge AFB area.

3. Attention is invited to recommendation in para 5, page 2 of basic letter. It is recommended that the following information be incorporated in reply to Continental Air Command's recommendation:

a. Concur as follows with conclusions reached by Continental Air Command in regard to incident described in basic letter and its inclosures:

- "the magnitude of the velocity and accelerations of the three (1) dimensional movements of the "object" reported are beyond the capability of known heavier or lighter than air vehicles in controlled flight."
- "supporting this is the fact that the 'object' was reported as (2) remaining stationary in free space for a mean-period of two minutes.

There is a conflict in data on the incident; one witness states that Ъ. the incident occurred on 8 March (see Incl. 2, page 2, 1st para.) and other witness states incident occurred on 9 March (see Incl. 1, page 1, 1st para;)

c. What is believed to have been a similar incident, also observed by radar (SCR-584), occurred at Wright-Patterson AFB on the morning of 8 March 1950. At approximately 0745 two airline pilets reported that they had seen a long slender body at about 10,000 ft approaching from the northwest. The object was picked up by observers at the Vandalia control tower who observed the object through bineculars. The control tower vectored an F-80 aircraft to the approximate

ñ. **T0:** DATE position of the 'object' but the pilot could see nothing although the control tower was still in visual contact with ite. Later, an F-51 attempted to track the object. It could not intercept it. During this time radar had not been able to detect any strange objects of any sort. However, at about 1130 hours signals of large amplitude were being received on an SCR-584. An F-80 was vectored to the approximate location of the targets and reported back that strips of ice laden clouds running northwest to southwest were visible at approximately 10,000 ft. This information concurred with plots obtained by the radar and gave conclusive evidence that the radar targets were in fact reflections from the ice laden clouds. The earlier visual sightings were apparently due to the morning sun shining through the ice laden clouds causing an optical illusion.

d. Although the 'object' observed on radar at Selfridge AFB was characterized by velocities ranging from zero to approximately 420 mph, and erratic changes in altitude which showed no intelligent maneuvering, the observations could easily have been the result of turbulent conditions in ice laden atmosphere. A study of the weather in the Selfridge AFB area during twenty-four Declassificati Thour periods on 8 and 9 March shows that such turbulent conditions could have prevailed. Such conditions are not unusual for that time of year.

e. As in the case of such incidents examined in the past, there has been no evidence that unusual observations have been the result of a new technolog ical advancement by an alien power. In every case where there has been sufficient usable data, it has been that a seemingly unusual observation was the result of misidentification. It was for this reason that requirements for special investigation of such incidents and the entire "Project Grudge" (unidentified aerial objects) were cancelled by Hq. USAF earlier this year. The discontinuance of special reporting and consideration has not stopped the reports of such

1. The United States Air Force has a continuing requirement for the reporting and technical analysis of observations of unconventional aircraft which might indicate an advance in technological progress of a foreign power. An unconventional aircraft, within the meaning of this directive, is defined as any aircraft or airborne object which by performance, aerodynamic characteristics, or unusual features, does not conform to any presently known aircraft type.

It is desired that information on unconventional aircraft 2. be reported in the following manner:

a. A separate report of each incident will be forwarded. No information other than that bearing on the unconventional aircraft will be included in this report.

b. Friority of transmission accorded the report will be that appropriate in the judgment of the forwarding agency, according to its apparent authenticity and importance as intelligence.

c. Reports will be forwarded to Commanding General, Air Materiel Command, Attention: MCIS.

d. Reports forwarded by electrical transmission will include, as far as possible:

- (1) A brief description of the object(s); its shape, size, color, number, formation if more than one, aerodynamic features, trail or exhaust, propulsion system, speed, sound, maneuvers, manner of disappearance, and other pertinent or unusual features.
- (2) Time sighted in 24-hour clock/zonal time, and me length of time observed. 330.2 Contract. 350.05 Contract.

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- (3) Manner of observation; visual or electronic, from air (give speed, altitude, and type of aircraft), or surface. Any type of optical or electronic equipment used should be described.
- (4) Location of observer during sighting, giving exact latitude and longitude as closely as feasible, and/or reference to a known landmark. Location of object(s) with respect to observer, giving distance, direction, and altitude.
- (5) Identifying information on observer(s) and witnesses. estimate of reliability and experience, and any factors bearing on estimated reliability of the sighting.
- (6) Weather and wind conditions (teletype sequences) at time and place of sightings.
- (7) Any activity or condition, meteorological or otherwise, which might account for the sighting.
- (8) Existence of any physical evidence; fragments, photographs and the like, of the sighting.
- (9) Interception or identification action taken. (Such action should be taken whenever feasible, complying with existing air defense directives.)

e. Reports forwarded by electrical transmission will be followed up within ten (10) days by a written report on AF Form 112. This report will contain the same information specified in subparagraph 2d above in greater detail, and where feasible will include sketches and signed attested narrative statements of observers.

f. Written reports of sightings, where no previous electrically transmitted report has been submitted, will follow the same form as the written follow-up report described in subparagraph 2e above.

g. Any physical evidence of the sighting will be forwarded by most expeditious means to Commanding General, Air Materiel Command, Attn: MCIS, under cover of a letter identifying the shipment with the report of sighting. Mention of the method and time of shipping of this evidence will be included in written report of the sighting.

3. It is desired that no publicity be given this reporting or analysis activity.

Some months ago, I contacted a Pefessor Albert Hovings of Calgary Alberta, Canada. He had some airplanes I was interested in buying. During the course of negotiations he brings in the idea that he has in his possession a flying saucer, and claims to have flown the thing over most of weatern candda and most of the United States. He claims it has now wings at all, has speeds from zero to sixteen hundred miles per hour and can land on either land or water. I asked the Professor why he had not taken it to the RCAF and it seems he has a great hatred for the english but mentioned that he would be interested in taling to U.S. officicals about it. Incidentally he is a dutch immigrint and has been patenting under half a dozen foreign countries.

I am a former Naval officer and do not consider myself a moron. as you may have suspected by this time, I believe Hovings actually has this contraption and that it has actually flow. I believe I can get Hovings to show us the machine and actually demonstrate. You may already have a line on this guy or the Canadians may know about him, but I do believe he merits some investigation and perhaps cultivating.

#### MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD

#### PROBLEM:

1. To reply to an Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) library request for microfilm files on Project Grudge during 1949.

#### FACTS AND DISCUSSION:

2. The librarian for technical information, AEC, in a letter dated 14 March 1950, to Air Materiel Command (AMC) has requested the microfilm file for 1949 pertaining to Project Grudge for use by one of AEC's major laboratories.

3. AEC letter has been referred to Hq. USAF by AMC with comment that these microfilms are the detailed incident investigations. AMC states that they can forward them to AEC if Hq. USAF instructs that it be done but that they can see no useful purpose in doing so.

4. During the period that Project Grudge was active, AFOIV was in contact with AEC (through ID, GSUSA) on the incident reports from the Los Alamos, New Mexico, area. Later, when the project was concluded, Major Boggs, AFOIV, conferred with Dr. Kramish, Division of Intelligence, AEC, on the findings of Project Grudge. Copy of final report on Project Grudge was sent to the Library of AEC on 2 February 1950. This report contains conclusions which are based on the detailed investigations contained in the microfilm which AEC is now requesting.

5. Project Grudge has been concluded by the USAF but the microfilm files are a record of discontinued activity; however, there is no objection to their being used by AEC on a loan basis. Most of these records remain classified because of personal data on witnesses collected by OSI investigators and will not be downgraded.

6. 1st Indorsement to basic letter has been prepared to Commanding General, AMC, instructing that microfilm files be furnished AEC on a loan basis to be used under their present classification.

1. In compliance with letter, Department of the Army, GSUSA, CSGID 452.1, dated 25 March 1948, subject: Unconventional Aircraft, control number A-1917, the following information received from the Fifth Army Regional Office, Indianapolis, Indiana, is forwarded.

> "On 12 April 1950, an agent interviewed Mr. Earl F. Baker, 1310 North McCann Street, Kokomo, Indiana, sheet metal fabricator with the Continental Steel Corporation, 1200 West Markland, Kokomo, Indiana, Informant stated that, upon being awakened by his dog at 0200, 8 April 1950, he saw an 'object' about two hundred feet in the air, almost directly overhead. This 'object' was a grayish metal disc approximately fifteen feet in diameter and fifty feet in circumference, shaped approximately like a child's toy top. On the top bulge of the 'object' he saw a small conning tower as the whole thing tilted occasionally. The 'object' rotated slowly on its perpendicular axis, and informant saw three small port holes on the outer rim. These port holes showed a blue-white light from within. After hovering for approximately two minutes the 'object' rose soundlessly and without tilting moved away to the north at a speed approximating that of a conventional type of aircraft at take-off. Informant could furnish no further information as to size or appearance of the apparition."

2. Since the referenced letter is more than two years old this office desires to know if continued compliance is still requested.
